THE LORD TAKES HOME BILL SATOW

Bill went home to be with Jesus on September 8, 2019. Bill passed away peacefully on his 90th birthday, following a brief stay at Eskaton Care Center Fair Oaks. Bill was born to parents, Riichi and Chiyeko Satow, on September 8, 1929. Bill grew up in Sacramento. During the war, the family, including his brothers and sisters, Sus, Oscar, Leo, Ted, Ernie, Tish, Chiyo and Hannah, along with other family members, was sent to the internment camp at Poston, Arizona, where they stayed for approximately half a year.

Japanese friends then requested the family come to Keenesburg, Colorado, to work on the farm. It was hard work. A year after the war was over, the Satow family decided they wanted to move back to California. Bill had just gotten his driver's license. Six kids and two adults loaded everything they had into a car and a truck and headed West.

Prior to Poston, and while Bill was growing up, he attended Edward Kelly School, the one-room school house on Bradshaw Road. He would always remember their very special teacher, Miss Cox, during those years. Miss Cox is the person who first began calling him "Bill," and it stuck with him ever since. Although she was very poor, she had a car and would drive the kids to the ball games. After the war, Bill and the other students got together and threw a party for her in appreciation for all she had done for them. A single female teacher barely made enough to live on. Years later, they heard she had passed away and was in a potter's grave in Dixon, without even a headstone. Bill and the former students got together, collected money, and had a nice ceremony for her and arranged for a headstone.

Bill spent four years in the Air Force. Once, while on temporary assignment in Greenland, he worked on planes as part of the Engine Replacement Crew. This experience gave him the skills to continue working on and replacing engines, which is how his family could afford their cars.

After serving in the Air Force, Bill went on to graduate from Sac State, earning his Masters in Economics. While in school, he met a lovely school secretary, Betty Kataoka. You guessed it! They were married on August 7, 1960, in Satow Hall, which at that time was the church Sanctuary. They enjoyed 59 years of marriage and had two children, Kevin and Valerie, and three wonderful granddaughters.

Following graduation, Bill went to work for the State of California, Dept. of Boating and Waterways. His work sent him on travels up and down California as he helped to develop the coastal and inland waterways. He loved his work and it gave him much pleasure.

Bill was a lifelong and faithful member of Mayhew Community Baptist Church, and was a part of the construction of its buildings. He especially loved the huge beams. He had such fond memories of the many years the

parishioners, along with people from the community, came together to build this beautiful church. He always remembered and was thankful for all the ladies bringing food to feed the hungry crew. It was a long-term team effort. Everything was volunteer.

Bill served in many ministries within the church. He had a wonderful voice and sang in the choir. He was the youngest Moderator ever to serve. He served on the Diaconate Board, the Board of Trustees, Pastoral Search and Selction Committee, and in numerous ministries. He was the umpire of the baseball team and loved to watch the church's sports events.

In his retirement years, Bill enjoyed water color classes at the Rancho Cordova Senior Center and participated in their weekly singing sessions. For ten years straight he traveled to Roswell, New Mexico for an Air Force reunion.

Over this last decade, although he was not serving in a specific ministry, he provided much encouragement and wisdom, and expressed thankfulness to the church leadership and all those who were dedicating themselves to God's kingdom.


Our hearts and prayers go out to Betty and the family. There are many eras within a church, some of which overlap each other and some are still continuing. Without a doubt, Bill's passing marks the end of a very special era, not only in the church but in other areas his life has touched. Bill can most certainly claim what the Bible says in 2 Timothy 4:7-8: "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith: Henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness, which the Lord the righteous judge, shall give me at that day; and not to me only, but unto all them also that love his appearing."
